**Snippets of History:** In the light of the current upsurge of local commercially brewed boutique beers, it seemed timely to look at the story of the breweries and brewers of Armidale, based on Graham Wilson's article in ADHS Journal 37, Lionel Gilbert's *An Armidale Album* and newspaper advertisements.

The early hotels were inns for accommodation and refreshments and small shanties along travel routes provided alcoholic refreshment. In April 1850 licences had been approved for five Armidale hostelries and John Warn Tuck of Maitland set up a brewery on two and a half acres in Dumaresq Street (between Markham and Allingham) 'near Allingham's Flour Mill'. This relieved the publicans of freight costs from Sydney/Maitland. But the brewery, operated by **R.S. Jenkins** was put to auction in early 1852, prompting Edward Butler, proprietor of the Victoria Hotel (north Beardy St, between Marsh and Taylor) to encourage potential buyers with his advertisement - A Brewer! A Brewer! A Brewer! at Armidale .....where a fortune awaits him. I an 1854 inquiry into the 'alarming increase in intemperancy in the Colony', Armidale, a town of around 600 inhabitants, did not enhance its reputation for sobriety! **R.S. Jenkins** continued to run the Brewery, which appears to have been leased by Lewis Markham, until Mr Edward Baker leased it in June 1865, with Mr Butler the licensee. Meanwhile, the Messrs Jenkins had been manufacturing lemonade and soda water in Barney St which appears to have progressed to be a Markham Street cordial factory and brewery by January 1867. In 1871 Charles **Jenkins** was praised for the quality of the products of his brewery - relating this to the fine water in his 40 foot well. Jenkins had Mr Harper demolish his 'old brewery' in 1873, after his father Richard died. This would have been the Dumaresq Street building. He then sold his Markham Street enterprise to Bernard Hertzog before leaving the district in 1875. Hertzog indicated that demand for his ale exceeded supply and it would seem Newcastle continued to be main the source of beer for the town. In late 1879 a brewer of 15 years experience was needing a partner to set up a brewery and after the sale of six acres fronting Beardy, Butler and Dumaresq sts, Mr Peter Simpson built a brewery fronting Butler street on part of this land. This was for sale in 1887 and purchased by Messrs Billson of Beechworth and Albury, by which time the Star Hotel was opposite, (on SW corner of Butler St and Brewery Lane). In quick succession this City Brewery changed hands - Hillier and Solomon, A.P. Cunningham, J.T. Rampling, R. Scholes and Rampling – and from 1890 to March 1893, John Francis McKinlay, who built the swimming pool on the south side of Dumaresq Creek at the rear of the Brewery. In 1893 Stephen Hillier took over and in 1895 W. A. Allen had the Brewers Licence with Mrs Hermann the owner of the premises. In 1900 with the sale of her estate, the Brewery and the City Brewery Cottage (demolished 2019) were possibly bought by William Allen. The Sydney Breweries became dominant after World War One and the City Brewery was demolished in early 1920.
