Snippets of History: In Beardy Street, a number of the original 'turn of the century and before' buildings remain, albeit with alterations and new façades. However many, sometimes substantial buildings have been confined to history. An example is the corner of Beardy and Jessie Sts (Lot 1 Section 1) where, in 1967, the Dumaresq Shire built the two storey building which now houses Insurance and other offices. Original owners of Lot 1 and adjoining Lot 15, (the Jessie Street frontage) were Michael Redmond and John Mather. Redmond had an accommodation house on the corner, first listed (*Express* 25/6/1864) as a Mortgagee Sale. The house was described as a comfortable and substantial residence of 9 rooms, stable, barn, garden and an excellent well. After the death of Mrs Redmond in 1869, the house (14 rooms) was To Let and then on the market. Markham, and E.M. Butler were subsequent owners and Butler, by 1881, had added a shop and 3 extra rooms to the house. From 1881 to 1886 it was for sale and it became part of Butler's Estate. P. Stewart purchased the 'small weatherboard store and old accommodation house' in February 1886 and re-sold to Mr McKellar in February 1887. Then (AE 7/8/1891), in a report that Mr Kelk would conduct his first auction of produce, stock, poultry etc in his fine new mart on the corner, it was said that there had previously been a blacksmith on the site. 'Some pillars of the smithy were retained, a splendid floor had been laid down on a solid foundation and the sides of the mart were snugly weatherboarded.' It was 'well-lit' by skylights and windows with a Beardy St entrance seven feet (2.1 metres) between two shops. The 50 ft (9 metres) building was proportionately broad, roofed with iron, over shingles. 'There was a fine side delivery entry in Jessie Street while at the rear were piggeries, fowl coops etc with ample convenience for carts and horses.'

Success was assured; weekly Saturday sales had every imaginable item on offer with intervening business activities. However, in 1908 the **Kelk** family left for Sydney with sale of their home and associated goods at the corner of Jessie and Mossman Street. First mention of **Kelk** was in March 1889 when he took over **T.J. Wilkinson's** General Store in Beardy Street West and, as a member of the Armidale Monthly Holiday Association, promoted closure of businesses on the first Wednesday of each month. In March 1891, his 16 year-old daughter died after a prolonged illness and by April he had sold his Store to **H.W. Lane.** In July he successfully applied for an Auctioneer's Licence and then opened his Auction Mart in August.

**Piddington's** opened a toy shop and Undertakers in Beardy Street in 1899 and by 1909 were possibly in one of the Kelk shops, described being 'in the vicinity of the corner office block and the Mandarin Restaurant of today.' (ADHSJ 60). The **Empire Hotel** (opposite) was demolished to make way for **Woolworths** in the 1960s. By then, 'Kelk's corner' was empty and **Humphrey's**, then **Hardman's** Used Car yard of the 1950s, were no longer there. The time had long gone from the Saturday morning noisy, hustle and bustle crowded atmosphere of Sale Day, the busy guest house, the clang of the blacksmith's shop and the allure of vehicles on display to hopeful car owners.
