Snippets of History: The Society recently received a quilt which has been passed on to the Armidale Folk Museum as a more appropriate keeping place. The accompanying information from the donor, **Lorraine Cobcroft**, indicated that the quilt was handmade during the Great Depression by her great grandmother, **Elizabeth Ann Woods** (nee Horner), handed down to her daughter **Bridget Maria Marshall** (nee Woods), then to her daughter, Lorraine's mother, **Gladys Kingdom** (nee Marshall).

Information provided with the quilt indicates that '**John Horner** was a brickmaker who was partly responsible for the manufacture of the bricks used in St Mary's and St Peter's Cathedrals. He carted the mud by bullock dray from 'Saumarez' and had kilns at what was known in the 70s and 80s as Fittler's Farm. His daughter Elizabeth, (b. 1861) married Irish immigrant **Patrick Dennis Woods**, (1838-1926) who worked at John's brickworks and share-farmed at 'Eurandangie'. Patrick's family were wealthy, but he apparently misbehaved (with a young lady) at university, brought shame on the family and was given a stipend for life on condition that he migrated to Australia and never returned.'

Elizabeth and Patrick had ten children, the fourth being **Bridget**, born 1885, who lived to be 102. Bridget's daughter **Gladys Marshall** told her memories of watching her grandmother Elizabeth sitting in a rocking chair in the kitchen, candle alight on the table beside her, delicately and precisely stitching every piece in the growing number of quilts she made. The fabrics of the quilts were all pieces cut from outgrown and worn clothing, worn in the depression by Elizabeth's grandchildren. Gladys could identify every piece and the name and age of the child who wore the garment it came from and often the special occasion for which the garment was first made and worn.

The Centenary Shield for Rifle Shooting: The Society is custodian of the Armidale Rifle Club cups which are on display at Dumaresq Chambers. We now have the Centenary Shield for Rifle Shooting to put on display. This large handsome trophy with bronze decorations was donated by the Armidale, Uralla, Guyra and Hillgrove Clubs in 1937 (*AE* 1/4/1938). It is thought to have been named Centenary as 1938 was the Sesquicentenary of European settlement. Competition for the shield was held annually to 1940, with ten person teams shooting three seven shot matches. World War Two intervened and competition resumed in 1948. The shield has 141 silver plates on both front and back, each naming members of the winning teams. These records are to 1980, as the shield was 'lost' in 1981. In 2022, it was recovered, having been stored in its large wooden box under a bed for 22 years. The winning Clubs recorded are Armidale (49), Walcha (27), Tamworth (19), Coonabarabran (12), Spring Ridge (8), Glen Innes (7), Hillgrove (4), Port Macquarie (3) while Uralla, Narrabri, Woods Reef/Barraba, Manilla, Inverell each won the shield twice and Wollomombi and Gunnedah once.
