Snippets of History: The Corner of Marsh and Brown Streets

Today the homes gracing this intersection provide us with a wealth of local historythey comprise 'Teragram' and 'Belmore Cottage' on the Northern corners and 'Stockton' and 'Birida' on the South.

The history of the Californian bungalow style weatherboard home 'Teragram' (Margaret spelt backwards) at 163 Marsh Street (Lot 1 Section 17) before the Turner family purchased it in the 1950s is sparse, but the original half-acre block of land is recorded in the name of Arthur Hunter Palmer on the 1866 Plan of the Town of Armidale.

In 1840, young Irish-born Arthur became the manager of Henry Dangar's pastoral holdings including 'Gostwyck' in Armidale. Palmer purchased a number of town lots and also 'Palmerston', 400 acres on the Dangarsleigh Road which he sold to the Dangars on leaving Armidale in 1863. It would appear that he also sold Lot 1 Section 17 on the north-east corner of Marsh and Brown streets to Joseph Scholes senior who built and lived nearby at 'Newton Terrace' 175 Marsh Street. Palmer married Cecilia, daughter of ex-whaler and Armidale businessman Archibald Mosman (correctly spelt where his whaling station was situated in Mosman, Sydney and misspelt in Mossman Street Armidale). Palmer became a successful pastoralist in Queensland and entered politics to become Premier of Queensland 1870-74. Joseph Scholes was a leading figure in early Armidale history, with numerous business interests and town properties. In 1857 Scholes and a number of other parents published their satisfaction with the education their children were receiving at the new Armidale Grammar School under the tutelage of Dr Thomas and his wife. In December of that year Dr Thomas advertised that the school had 'moved to commodious premises expressly erected for him in Marsh Street'. This most likely was on Joseph Scholes' Lot 1 Section 17 as by 1866 Thomas' Grammar School receives no further mention but in 1866 Robert Mayhew is running a similar-named school, which in 1868 is described as opposite 'Belmore Cottage' in Marsh Street. He also advertised that he was endeavouring to start a chess school. [On 17/3/1873 an Express article describes a game of chess played by telegraph

[On 17/3/1873 an Express article describes a game of chess played by telegraph between Messrs Robins and Mayhew of Armidale and Creed and Lardner of Glen Innes. It extended over five hours during which time forty moves were made. An 'ingenious' move by Mr Robins secured a win for Armidale!].

In December 1873 **Robert Mayhew** put up for auction 'the whole of his costly and valuable household furniture, books, land, stores' (and the list is impressive), the sale was unreserved and **Mayhew** was leaving the district.

By January 1874 **Joseph Scholes** advertised that the 'House and Premises situate in Marsh Street, lately occupied by **R. Mayhew Esq.** as a boarding school' was To Let. From 1902 to 1904 similar advertisements were placed in the *Armidale Express* for the sale of 'Allotment 1 of Section 17 on the corner of Brown and Marsh streets on three quarters of an acre of land on which is erected that large weatherboard dwelling known as 'Koonawarra'. No further references as to when 'Koonawarra' met its fate.
